George Stephanopoulos Presents Keynote Speech at Scholarship Luncheon

The Tri-C Foundation welcomed ABC News chief Washington correspondent George Stephanopoulos as the keynote speaker of the 2009 Presidential Scholarship Luncheon. On October 13, the Luncheon drew a sellout crowd of 1,100 to the Cleveland Renaissance Hotel and raised \$814,000 for student scholarships.

Stephanopoulos, an Orange High School graduate, shared tales about the beginning of his political career in Cleveland, and how it led him to where he is today. Stephanopoulos is currently



the chief Washington correspondent for ABC News and host of ABC's Sunday morning political affairs program, This Week with George Stephanopoulos, where he oversees the network's coverage of Presidential and Congressional politics, and reports on political and policy stories for all ABC News platforms including World News with Charles Gibson, Nightline, Good Morning America,

ABCNews.com and ABC News Now. He came into the national spotlight while working in the Clinton administration as senior advisor to the President for policy and strategy.

"It's great to be here to support Cuyahoga Community College, one of the premier assets and most prominent institutions in Northeast Ohio," said Mr. Stephanopoulos. "It comes at a time when I think we're all starting to realize, and policy makers in Washington are starting to realize, just how important, how critical, community colleges are to our economy. They are the lifeblood of our economy."

Tri-C Completes First Successful Summer Pathways Program

"Earning and learning" could have been the motto for over 410 Greater Cleveland youth this summer. The youth, ages 14 to 24, found summer jobs and possible future careers through Tri-C's Summer Pathways Project. Tri-C's Youth Technology Academy (YTA) operated Summer Pathways with support from the City of Cleveland/Cuyahoga County Workforce Investment Board using federal stimulus funds (American Recovery and Reinvestment Act 2009), to provide both educational experiences and employment opportunities for eligible Cuyahoga County youth.

Participants were placed in various departments within the College, including Human Resources, Key Career Place, Customer Service, and Information Technology, while many others served as tutors for other youth and as junior camp counselors. Tri-C also relied on community partners like Cuyahoga County Employment and Family Services, the Cleveland Heights/ University Heights Library, Ford Motor Company, Cleveland Hopkins International Airport, Cleveland Public Power and several Cleveland area neighborhood organizations to provide summer placements for many of the youth.

Through YTA, participants benefited from individual goal setting and success strategy sessions, leadership training, résumé writing workshops, and reading and writing assessments.

Summer Pathways was a resounding success, based on comments from placement partners like Cleveland Hopkins International Air Traffic Control Tower, which said "We were all impressed with the exceptional quality of students you sent to our Air Traffic Control Facility. We hope to work with you in the future."

Give and Receive: The Benefits of Year-End Giving

When you make a charitable gift to the Tri-C Foundation by December 31, 2009 you are entitled to significant tax savings while supporting our mission. The assets you give will determine your deductions when you itemize. For example:

- Cash. Your gift is fully tax-deductible up to 50 percent of your adjusted gross income (AGI) in the year you make your gift. You are allowed to carry over any excess deduction for up to five additional years.
- Stock. A gift of long-term appreciated stock offers two tax savings. First, you avoid capital gains tax. Second, you receive an income tax deduction—based on the increased value of the stock instead of its cost basis—of up to 30 percent of your AGI, with a five-year carryover for any excess.
- Real estate. With real estate held for more than one year, you can deduct the value of your gift up to 30 percent of your AGI, with a five-year carryover. You generally receive a deduction based on the property's fair market value and pay no capital gains tax.
- Tangible personal property. By giving personal property related to our tax-exempt function, you may be
 eligible for a deduction for its fair market value up to 30 percent of your AGI with a five-year carryover, and
 avoid capital gains tax. For a gift unrelated to our function, the deduction is limited to your cost basis and is
 deductible up to 50 percent of your AGI.

Complete your charitable gift transaction by December 31 to ensure that your gift is eligible for a 2009 charitable deduction!

Tri-C Faculty Recognizes the Important Role of Community College



Dr. Donna Homenko is a professor of Dental Hygiene and Bioethics at Tri-C's Metropolitan Campus. Joining the faculty as a lecturer in Fall 1977 and taking a tenure-track faculty position in 1978, she also served as program coordinator in Health Careers from 1980-1992 before returning to full faculty status. Like so many Tri-C faculty and staff, her commitment to students doesn't end when she leaves the classroom. Homenko proudly supports student scholarships at Tri-C, and has been a committed donor to the Tri-C Foundation since 1993.

Homenko, a licensed dental hygienist, knows the importance of education to the healthcare industry in our region. With 85 percent of Tri-C graduates remaining in the area after graduation, our students are the workforce of tomorrow. "One of my favorite days of the year is Commencement," explained Homenko. "I've easily attended more than 25 of these ceremonies and always come away with the same feeling. Watching the graduates cross the stage and realizing that we, as faculty, have changed their lives forever is truly rewarding!"

For Homenko, and others like her, the value of Tri-C is clear. "Many of our students represent the first generation in their family to receive a college diploma, and I'm proud to be a part of that experience," she said. "In Northeast Ohio, we are fortunate to have many institutions of higher learning, but for anyone who desires to learn a new skill set, re-enter the college scene as an adult, try a few courses while still in high school, or participate in a program leading to licensure or career advancement, Tri-C can fulfill all of those needs. We're here to promote the student, and in turn that person will become a viable member of our surrounding community."


